-Meet Harley-



When Harley arrived at our shelter, we had no idea this sweet 3 year goldenhound mix was suffering from a crippling condition called bilateral medial patella luxation (MPL). MPL is a condition where the patella (knee-cap) does not stay in its normal position in the groove on the end of the femur (thigh bone) and will pop-out, or luxate, to the medial (inside) surface of the knee. After being evaluated by orthopedic surgeon Dr. Ralphs, it was determined that Harley was at levels 3/4, which is the most severe and would require surgical repair. The higher luxation is typically progressive over time, as the repeated luxation of the patella leads to wear on the bone and the development of arthritis, as well as other changes to the bones and muscles of the limb. This condition can be crippling for a dog of Harley's size, and he was already showing signs of daily discomfort and pain.

Harley was quick to become a staff and volunteer favorite! Word had spread fast about Harley's need for surgery and mounting medical bills, and thanks to so many of you offering to help, we were able to raise enough funds for Harley to undergo his first surgery. He is now recovering with his foster dad and ARRI volunteer David, while receiving weekly physical therapy at Rhode Island Pet Rehab. He will be reevaluated by Dr. Ralphs again in early May, not only to look at his progress thus far, but to determine Harleys need for future medical care. It won't be long before this sweet, goofy guy is ready to find his forever home, which I am sure will not be difficult to find since he continues to win over the hearts of everyone he meets.

Does your pup have the "gift" of clearing a room with his offensive flatulence? You may think your dog's gas only impacts those in his/her direct vicinity, but it is actually a signal of distress from your fur covered friend! Often times the underlying cause of excess gas is dietary-related, but it can also be caused by swallowing excess air (think of the dog gobbling down his food too fast) or possibly due to an acute or chronic intestinal ailment

A quick and effective way to help stop the suffering (and the stink factor) is to add fresh, finely chopped parsley to their meals! Add 1 teaspoon per meal per 50-lbdog and be ready for stink-free days in your future.
