Major came from a life of breeding and neglect. His entire life was lived outside in a pen, never to have known the warmth of indoors or the love and devotion of a family. Luckily, an alert outsider had noticed Major, his mate Rosa and daughter Victoria living in horrid conditions and alerted authorities.

Immediately after rescue he was brought to the vet for evaluation. He was found to be high heartworm positive, was bald from years of fleas with no treatment and was extremely emaciated. His skin was very tough and was compared to that of an elephant by his rescuer. It took a total of 2 months to rid his body of parasites and another 2 months to pack on weight, so much so he is now affectionately known as "Major Chunks'.




Despite his horrific past, his spirit has never been shattered. He has been adopted locally to a loving family where we are told he is making

"He is sweet, snuggly and very proud of himself when he learns something new. We are looking forward too many more years of spoiling him and letting him live the good life!"





# CHAINED NO MORE




Hank spent 7 years of his life chained to a tree until neighbors convinced the owner to relinquish him. Thankfully he was rescued, because he was heartworm positive and suffered from a painful anterior cruciate ligament rupture. If left untreated, it

almost always leads to progressive osteoarthritis and is extremely debilitating. Upon rescue, he was very thin, scrappy and had severe fly bites to both ears.

Unfortunately, chained dogs are very prevalent in the south. Dogs are naturally social beings and thrive on interaction with humans and other animals. Being chained in one spot for hours, days or even months can cause immense psychological damage, often not reversible. However, Hank was determined! He spent the next 10 months recouping both emotionally and physically, while he learned to socialize with other dogs.

Hank now shares his home with Kim and Todd, as well as his best friend and canine companion Wyatt. Thanks to this family's kindness, Hank will never know the isolation of the outdoors ever again. Just a warm and loving home, soft bed and an endless supply of tennis balls. Both Kim and Todd feel very fortunate to have Hank in their lives and we have no doubt the feeling is mutual.







# **Benefits of Microchipping:**

- If your dog or cat is lost or stolen, the chip and its registration is definitive proof of ownership.
- Microchips are permanent and can't be separated from your pet.
- A microchip greatly increases the likelihood that your pet will be returned to you if they are lost.
- When a lost pet is found and taken to a shelter or vet, the first thing they will do is scan the animal for a microchip. Once the chip is located and scanned, they can search the microchip registry to locate the owner of the animal, saving time for both you and the rescuer.
- Microchips last a lifetime, there is no need to replace after a certain amount of time.

If you adopted a pet from ARRI, no need to worry because your animal is already chipped. You just need to make sure that your registration is currently up to date in case of emergency and have your veterinarian check the chip from time to make sure it hasn't malfunctioned. Finally, always have a tag on your pet with its name and phone number as the primary way of returning your lost pet to you.
