This boy was a fighter, and with the right medications and Carolyn's care, Pounce was once more on the road to recovery. His weight doubled, his coat became luxurious, and every day Pounce finds his patch of sunshine for his daily nap.

Whatever time Pounce has left will be spent with Carolyn.

You see, foster care volunteers are invaluable to our pets. They open their hearts and, temporarily, their homes to animals that aren't ready for adoption, some because of behavioral or medical issues and others that need the quiet of a home to prepare for future adoption.

Then there are the tough ones like Pounce that are terminally ill, and we just don't know how much time they have left. ARRI makes sure that every day for the rest of their lives will be spent in comfort. Carolyn is not only a member of our foster teams, but also of our "fospice" (foster/hospice) group. Carolyn's goal is to provide Pounce with that sunny patch every day he has left.

Dobby, removed from a hoarder's home, was the only surviving kitten from his litter. Upon his arrival, we found an emaciated, 11-week-old Siamese kitten suffering from an upper respiratory infection, but we were not deterred. Dobby arrived with his mother and spent the first few days hiding behind her in their cage. We knew he needed an extra special touch.



We reached out to Kasey, a supporter who has a special love for Siamese cats, and it was a match. When Kasey and Dobby met, it was magic!

Kasey took Dobby home, but he wasn't out of the woods yet. The little guy stopped eating and was soon down to 1.6 lbs.— half of what he should have been. Dobby was whisked to the veterinary hospital where he had days of extensive testing and care. Slowly he started to eat, regaining much-needed weight. Now there was no holding him back!

With his new impish energy and behavior, a new name was in order and Dobby was aptly renamed Loki, for the god of mischief!

In no time, Loki found his place in his new family. Small but mighty, he made his presence known. He bonded with his new



big brother Mo and other feline siblings. Now, he can often be found sleeping on top of them or curled up with Mo's arm protectively around him.

When an echocardiogram provided a diagnosis of degenerative valvular disease, Bo started his lifesaving medication, and we proceeded with his critical dental care. As Bo recovered, his outgoing, people-loving personality was back and even bigger! The best part? Bo's foster family offered him a permanent home!




On the Horizon... Construction news

is designed to accommodate 15 dogs in its main kennels and 5 dogs in its isolation kennels (animals from other states have a mandatory 5-day isolation period on arrival in RI). Creating



additional isolation kennels will enable ARRI to provide a safe and comfortable area for dogs completing their isolation period and provide
